
HAPPY NEW YEAR!!!!

To an 8 year old boy, Little League Baseball has one meaning and to a 64 year old boy it has another.

In 1955, when I was 8, Pennington Little League baseball was my favorite activity. Memories of those years of joy are so etched in my mind.

- My brother, Louis, played in 1954. Legion 33 team with Uncles Danny and Smokey McElyea.
- Mom let me try on Louis' uniform and I still have the picture. Putting on a baseball uniform was pure delight for us then.
- The League Champs Legion 33 team of 1954 were given a wiener roast celebration at the American Legion Post across the river near Stone Creek. I ate like I belonged on the team.
- I proudly played right field when I was 8.
- There was no pressure at our games, because we had already rehearsed many times by playing in the yard as Mickey, Yogi, Pee Wee, Willie and the Duke.
- My favorite memory: "Me and Louis" got new gloves from the Sears and Roebuck catalog. Even today, the smell of new leather takes me back to those nights of sleeping with my new glove.

Rev. Glen Daugherty, Little League Baseball president, announced today that plans have been made for a Little League parade in Pennington Saturday, May 24, 2 p.m. All Little Leaguers, wearing their new uniforms, will take part.

Following the parade at 2:00 p.m., the players, managers and umpires will go to Leeman Field where two exhibition games of three innings each will be played. The public is invited and there will be no admission charge to this or other Little League games.

All uniforms and playing equipment, including bases, catchers' mitts, leg guards, bats and balls, were purchased by the sponsoring organizations: The Town of Pennington Gap, Civitan Club, Legion Post 33 and the Lions Club. The teams are named the Sluggers, Civitans, Legion 33 and Lions.

Official season opens Monday, May 26, at Leeman Field. All games will be played starting at 6:30 p.m. The season's schedule was published in last week's issue of the News.

REGION TOURNAMENT STARTS AT NORTON ON MONDAY (All Star Team listed below will represent Lee County)

Pennington Gap Little League Baseball, playing its first year under a Little League charter, ended the 1952 thirty-six games schedule Tuesday evening. This final encounter matched the Civitans and Sluggers, and resulted in another victory for the Civitans. Monday, the Lions defeated Legion 33.

The final season results give the Civitans top place in the League, with 15 wins and 3 losses; Lions are 2nd with 9 wins and 9 losses; Legion 33 has 7 wins, 11 losses; Sluggers won 5 and lost 13.

Managers of the 4 Little League Teams, Joe Robinson of the Civitans, Fred King-Sluggers, Wayne Livesay-Lions, and Mitchell Carroll-Legion 33 have selected their All Star Team with Joe Robinson as manager. They will compete in the Regional Little League Tournament at Norton. Members are:

A JONESVILLE THREE-PEAT!

Every team, coach, and player begins each season with the goal of winning the championship. Holding the trophy aloft is an unforgettable moment. For many it will happen only once in a lifetime. Occasionally, some will remember back-to-back celebrations. The Jonesville High School 1949-50, 1950-51, and 1951-52 boys and girls basketball teams hold a record that may never be broken in Lee County. Both the boys and girls won the county basketball titles for three consecutive years..

<u>1949-1950</u>

Powell Valley News, March 2, 1950:

Jonesville Wins Both Titles In Lee Tourney

Jonesville High School is the proud holder of both basketball titles of the Lee County Cage Tournament for 1950. The Jonesville boys defeated Pennington Gap in the deciding game of the tournament Saturday night by a score of 57-26. Jonesville girls made victory complete by taking the final game in the feminine department, 61-58, from the hard fighting Dryden lassies.

Named to the All-County boys first team were: Jim Henderson, Reed Barrett, and C. D. Livesay from Jonesville; Bud Chadwell and Billy Hoskins of Thomas Walker; St. Charles' Bobby Harber and Charles Pendleton of Flatwoods. Girls All-County: Phylis Williams and and Peggy Orr of Jonesville; Billy Jean Wheeler of Thomas Walker; and Dryden's Mary Ellen Edens, Fearl Crabtree, and Dorothy Critt.
